Discussion Questions for "Neighbor Here, Neighbor There: Will It Be Easy?"

Matthew 5:43-48, Pastor Tom Olson, Weekend of November 25, 2018

Ice Breaker: Have you had any neighbor interactions in the last two weeks? How has this sermon series challenged you to be more intentional with those you live nearby?

- 1. What's the modern-day equivalent of "Love your neighbor and hate your enemy" (v. 43)? In other words, what does the same sentiment sound like today?
- 2. Look at v. 44. How does Jesus broaden and deepen the command to love your neighbor?
 - a. What is an *enemy*, according to Jesus? (What He says earlier in the chapter might help you answer this question like in vv. 10-12 & vv. 38-42.)
 - b. What, then, does is look like to *love* our enemies, according to Jesus? (The passages mentioned in the previous question might be helpful here, too!)
- 3. Who, specifically, are *your* enemies?
 - a. What practical steps can you take to start loving them *this very week?*
 - b. How, particularly, can your group help you or pray for you in this?
- 4. In v. 45, we see that loving our enemies makes us *like our Heavenly Father*.
 - a. How does He love His enemies?
 - b. How do you see the gospel in v. 45? That is, how do you see Jesus in v. 45?
 - c. In what ways do these answers *motivate* you to love your enemy?
 - d. Is it even possible to love your enemy without such motivation?
- 5. According to vv. 46-47, loving our enemies takes us *far beyond* the love of the godless (represented by "Gentiles") and the self-interested (represented by "tax-collectors").
 - a. Share a time when you've been loved in the way vv. 46-47 describes.
 - b. How can we, as sons and daughters of God, go *far beyond* this kind of love?
- 6. If we are commanded to *love our enemies*, how does this shed new light and bring fresh perspective on the command to *love our neighbors?*

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- 7. This three-week sermon series on loving our neighbors is intended, in large part, to help launch an outreach initiative that will occur throughout 2019 at our church.
 - a. What kind of outreach activity that you've engaged in has felt the most natural? What has felt the most forced and foreign to you?
 - b. As you look around your LIFE Group, what do you see in each person's history, temperament, and personality that could be used by God for outreach?
 - c. What are the names of 3-5 neighbors, friends, or co-workers that you'd really like to reach out to with the gospel of Jesus Christ?

Resource: Good conversations are always started with good questions. Here are 5 questions to help start a spiritual conversation with a non-believing friend:

- 1) What's making you happy in this season of your life?
- 2) What challenges or struggles are you facing?
- 3) What's your personal story when it comes to faith and God?
- 4) What do you believe about God?
- 5) What's your perception of Christians?

What questions would you add to this list?
